COURSE DESCRIPTION

In today's tense and rapidly changing world, understanding and indeed appreciating each other's cultures and the way in which we subsequently communicate with each other is of paramount importance. Not only does it prevent us from making dangerous assumptions about entire cultural groups based on the radical actions of a few, it also helps us to better interact with each other and to open our minds to new ways of doing and understanding things. The aim of this course is to acquire the theoretical knowledge that has been advanced in the field and then apply it to your own areas of research. Hence, the first half of the course will be more theoretical with these theories being put into practice in the second half of the semester. Throughout the course but particularly in the second half of the semester, we will examine papers on aspects of culture and communication. These will not only provide knowledge on the subject but will also serve as model examples of how research papers should be written.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- To understand the usefulness of theory as a way of changing how we think about the world.
- To change the way you think about and interact with the culture around you.
- To apply theories to the culture of daily life.
- To learn ways to analyze and evaluate various forms of cultural practice.

Requirements

I. Reaction Paper (20)

During the course you are expected to choose one topic which you will analyze in your reaction paper. In this paper you should use one central text to build up your argument. In addition I expect you to pull in other relevant sources (min. 1 – max. 2) to show me that you engaged with the topic and you are able to critically analyze the issue at stake (conceptualize problems; make connections between multiple sources etc.). Proper referencing is also a must. The reaction paper is expected to be between 800 and 1000 words.

II. Class Participation (20)

You are expected to actively take part in class discussions. Be prepared to ask questions and discuss various parts of the texts.

V. Presentations (2x10)

(1) First Presentation: You have to choose a text from the reader and connect a part of the text to a contemporary issue in communication (to something that you came across in the media for example). You can choose a newspaper article, an advertisement, music, film etc. the point is to raise our attention to the problem that you identify by using the concepts and arguments that you have read by that time in the chosen text. The presentation is due on the day the chosen text is scheduled. This presentation should be around 15 minutes.

You must send your presentations to my email address the day before the presentation is due.

(2) Second Presentation: Your task is to present a theme regarding your experiences about living in Hungary. I would like to hear comparative, interpretive discussions about the cultural differences that you came across here. This presentation should be restricted to one topic and you should give examples regarding the phenomenon. Presentations should not exceed 10 minutes.
