FYS 1170: First Year Seminar

An Introduction to the Liberal Arts through Research

Course Description

This course seeks to give students a firm understanding of the expectations that a liberal arts institution such as McDaniel College has of students pursuing a bachelor's degree, and to provide them with the tools to be able to succeed. The course also includes an important outreach element and involves a strong element of community engagement. Accordingly, students will learn to interact with the world and people beyond the college walls as part of a special project to develop content, such as interviewing migrants. This content will be used to help a migrants' association develop its online presence while developing a range of skills for students, such as social, interviewing, interpretation and writing up skills. This goal-based research will relate strongly to the particular major that the student is pursuing. For example, a psychology major may look at the psychology behind being a migrant.

Students are expected to help and learn from one another along the way and become acquainted with each others' majors. The course will also serve to familiarize participants with their environment culturally and politically. Another aspect is to already consider future career aims and to formulate ways of preparing to meet the demands to enter chosen fields.

Course objectives

- To develop information literacy so that students become better equipped to deal with the demands of college and subsequently working life.
- To develop critical thinking skills and apply them.
- For students to be able to find and critically process information independently through research.
- For students to produce content related to the field of their Major.
- To understand the process of creating an annotated bibliography from start to finish.
- To develop a certain level of understanding of how to go about researching within other Major specializations.
- To improve presentation skills and verbal presentation of ideas.

Learning outcomes

- Students demonstrate the ability to critically analyze college level material.
- Students convey effective oral communication, both in class presentations and informal discussions.

- Students demonstrate basic information literacy skills, including research, evaluation and citation.
- Students show an ability to construct an argument and offer appropriate evidence in support of their argument.
- Students can identify the resources and processes they need to use to apply them to their own work.
- Students have strategies for analyzing and interpreting all manner of texts.
- Students understand how to examine issues from an interdisciplinary-perspective.

How the course will be conducted

During the first weeks, class will mainly be conducted in a lecture/discussion format. However, a mini research project will require students' active participation, and, especially after the midterm break, students' individual research papers will become the focus of the class.

The final exam will consist of an oral presentation of your research as well as the completion of your annotated bibliography.

Honor code

Second, and perhaps a bit more difficult to understand, is the use of proper source citation. In composition you are expected to use outside sources, for example websites,` essays, interviews, etc. Without proper citation, an essay is claiming that the author is the source of such information. This is a form of academic dishonesty, and is treated in any forum as such.
