Course Description

This highly-interactive course explores the process and politics of policy making in the United States. The course will be structured by specific policy areas and the theories behind the policy process and analysis will be covered within this structure. In addition to reviewing the main areas of policy making, we will discuss specific case studies (mostly from quite recent history) to clearly understand the role of various actors, assess available policy alternatives, and evaluate the specific policy choices. By analyzing real world (and in some cases real time) policy making, the course intends to provide a deeper understanding of U.S. public policy through detailed analysis of the process of policy making.

Learning outcomes

Through active engagement during this course, participants should achieve:

- A clear understanding of the policy making process in the United States of America,
- A grasp of the theories of public policy analysis,
- Improved skills at engaging with and debating multiple sides of a policy issue, and
- The ability to write this analysis in a clear policy brief.

Assignments & grading

Class participation (10%)

You are expected to attend class, be prepared, and participate actively in the discussions throughout the semester. In-class short reading quizzes and participation in class debates may be included in the participation grade.

Policy briefs (30%)

Each student will write two short papers that argue two sides of a policy debate and provides a detailed assessment of which policy choice the participant would recommend. The papers should be 800-1200 words in length and cover relevant topics from recent public policy in the USA. These should be sent via email by midnight on the night they are due (September 29 and November 10). Participants should send the topic of the policy brief to the instructor one week before the deadline. The structure and expectations of the policy briefs will be discussed in class.

Current event reports (10%)

You are expected to follow events related to public policy in the U.S.A. in the news throughout the semester. At the beginning of class each Monday, we will devote 15 minutes to discussing current events. On at least 4 occasions, each student should bring an article from a newspaper, magazine, or other news source to class that they can summarize in 2-3 minutes and we can discuss. Some recommended sources will be circulated via email.

Midterm exam – March 20 (20%)

The mid-term exam will cover the topics from the first six weeks of the course. It will be written in-class and will consist of short answer and essay questions.

Final exam – due May 11 (30%)

The final exam will cover the topics from the entire course. It will be written in-class and will consist of short answer and essay questions.
