McDaniel College Budapest ENG 2204: Advanced Newswriting Course Syllabus Spring 2018

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Class times: Mondays (10.15-11.45am) & Wednesdays (10.45-11.45am)

Course Overview: Participants will continue to develop the skills acquired on the foundation course, putting them into constant practice with the aim of producing accomplished articles, which they can then present to prospective employers. We will continue to focus on developing reporting and writing skills and create different types of stories, but we will also look at how to edit articles. Students will be encouraged to pursue news research in their own selected fields, as well as to work as part of a team. We will also look at other applications of journalistic skills, such as in the field of PR and travel writing.

One of the goals of this course is to help students decide whether a career in journalism would be a good choice for them. Therefore, to try out working in the field, the classroom will be transformed into an editorial newsroom with students as journalists and the instructor as editor/coach. Students should see themselves as a news staff member, each with his/her own story assignment, but also as a member of a team that offers supportive criticism and encouragement to colleagues. Students will also further develop their editing skills with regular practice, including turning the Messenger draft articles into polished, publishable articles.

Course objectives

- To build upon the journalist skills acquired in ENG 1103
- To learn how to write articles in a wide range of journalistic styles
- To develop a portfolio of different kinds of articles
- To further develop reporting and writing skills
- To make students think proactively like journalists
- To better understand emerging trends in journalism
- To further improve creative writing and PR writing skills
- To help students decide whether to pursue a career in journalism

Learning outcomes

- Students will add to the core skills learned in ENG 1103
- Students will be able to write all the main styles of news articles
- Students will also be able to apply their writing skills to other disciplines
- Students will gain a solid understanding of both the practical and theoretical side of journalism
- Students will further develop reporting and newswriting skills and be able to create a wide range of different types of stories
- Students will have sufficient grounding in journalism to possibly consider joining working in the field
- Students will have a portfolio of articles to show to prospective employers
