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SIS-2039 – Paths of Innovation: Vienna, Prague, Budapest around 1900

SYLLABUS

This course examines how artistic and scientific innovation emerged in different forms in Central Europe at the turn of the 19th and 20th centuries, and spread out to become prominent trends all over Europe and the Americas, with ideas that were to be underlying themes of the 20th century. Symbolically, we have chosen three great innovators who lived in three major cities of the Austro-Hungarian Monarchy: Franz Kafka in Prague, Sigmund Freud in Vienna, and Béla Bartók in Budapest. We will consider not only the oeuvre of these intellectual giants, but also how they affected contemporary society and art, including literature, music, and the visual arts. Also, we will reflect upon their lasting influence in art, society, and popular thinking, including the ‘Kafkaesque’ in literature and film; Freudian theories in psychology and art; and Bartók’s influence on later composers and ethnomusicologists, as well as visual artists. Besides analysing literary and theoretical texts and works of art, this course will give a chance to participants to visit cultural venues in Budapest, and take part in a field trip to Prague and Vienna.

As the course focuses on the works of Freud, Kafka, and Bartók, each section of the semester will give an introduction to the achievements of these thinkers. To deepen the students’ knowledge, they will be given handouts which contain some primary texts of major importance of the period under discussion, as well as secondary sources. These texts will be required to be read at home and discussed together in class.

Requirements

Participation at the sessions is mandatory. The final grade will consist of class participation, including evaluation of responses to questions pertaining to mandatory reading and in-class discussion (33%); a mid-term test (33%); and an end-term essay (34%).

Course evaluation will be based on the following criteria:

They will be able to apply knowledge gained regarding their own culture and place in the global community, in order to make informed comparisons of different historical and/or cultural perspectives.

Students will demonstrate skills and attitudes (e.g., heightened self-awareness, capacity for perspective shifting, acceptance of global civic responsibility) conducive to intercultural competence, as well as knowledge of a cultural group outside of the United States.
