Senior Seminar – Political Science (PSI 4492)

Methods: Discussion and writing.

Goals: Developing and writing a senior thesis.

Outcome: The student will be required to write a roughly 30-40 page research paper on a subject of interest to him or her. The paper must include a central problem or question to be addressed, a coherent thesis and a sustained logical argument in defense of this thesis. The student will be expected to make a public oral presentation of his work at the end of the semester and answer questions about the research.

Requirements: Attending the class meetings, turning in the brief written assignments participating in the discussions, consulting regularly, completing the brief oral presentations, and writing a senior thesis. Since this course is designed to foster research skills, all papers will be research papers with proper citations and bibliographies.
