McDaniel College Budapest ENG 1103: Introduction to Journalism Course Syllabus Spring 2018

Course Overview: Participants will 'learn by doing', as the class will be organized to approximate the environment and functions of a news organization. Therefore, to try out working in the field, the classroom will be transformed into an editorial newsroom with students as journalists and the instructor as editor/coach. Students should see themselves as a news staff member, each with his/her own story assignment, but also as a member of a team that offers supportive criticism and encouragement to colleagues.

Course objectives

- To acquire and refine the tools needed to produce captivating and thought-provoking works of journalism
- To developing reporting and writing skills
- To make students think like journalists
- To better understand how news is reported
- To learn how to write the most important styles of journalistic articles
- To become more familiar with local and global news
- To help students decide whether future courses and even a career in journalism would be a good choice for them

Learning outcomes

- Students will be able to write the most important types of news articles
- Students will gain knowledge of how the news world operates
- Students will learn writing skills that can be transferred to other disciplines
- Students will improve writing and research skills
- Students will develop reporting and newswriting skills and be able to create different types of stories
- Students will acquire core skills that can be developed via further journalism study
